With mobile phones strictly forbidden, opportunities for 'top up' food shopping most definitely ruled out and an absence of any home comfort what-so-ever, students found themselves ready to take on the Duke of Edinburgh challenge - albeit weighed down by rucksacks stuffed with sleeping bags, cooking equipment, provisions and other necessities! Most important of all, though, was the need to wear good quality walking boots, as every student was going to be put through their paces by walking up to TWENTY kilometres each day over a two day period. A quest certainly not for the faint hearted!

Led by DofE Coordinator and P.E Teacher Mr Jordan, together with Mr Carter, Mr Burns, Mr Taylor and Mr Eacott, the group was divided into smaller teams of six or seven students and route cards were handed out for them to follow and complete as they forged along their daily hikes. Students had to employ their compass, map-reading and navigational skills throughout the venture.

Luck was most definitely on their side as the weather really couldn't have been better – sunshine throughout the day and mild temperatures during the night. Meals consisted of a numerous array of cereal bars, pasta and other 'only add boiling water' foods. (continued...)

The expedition is remotely supervised by school staff in remote areas of the Countryside, and all dates are communicated in writing and electronically in advance.
